

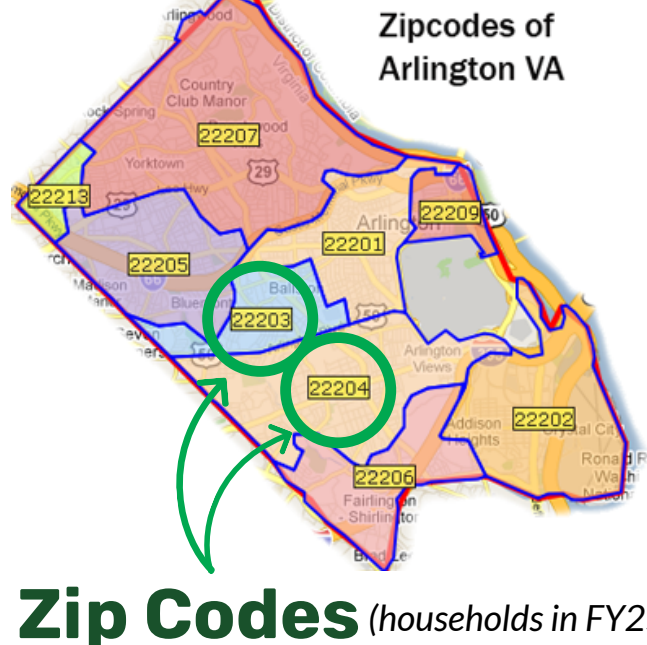

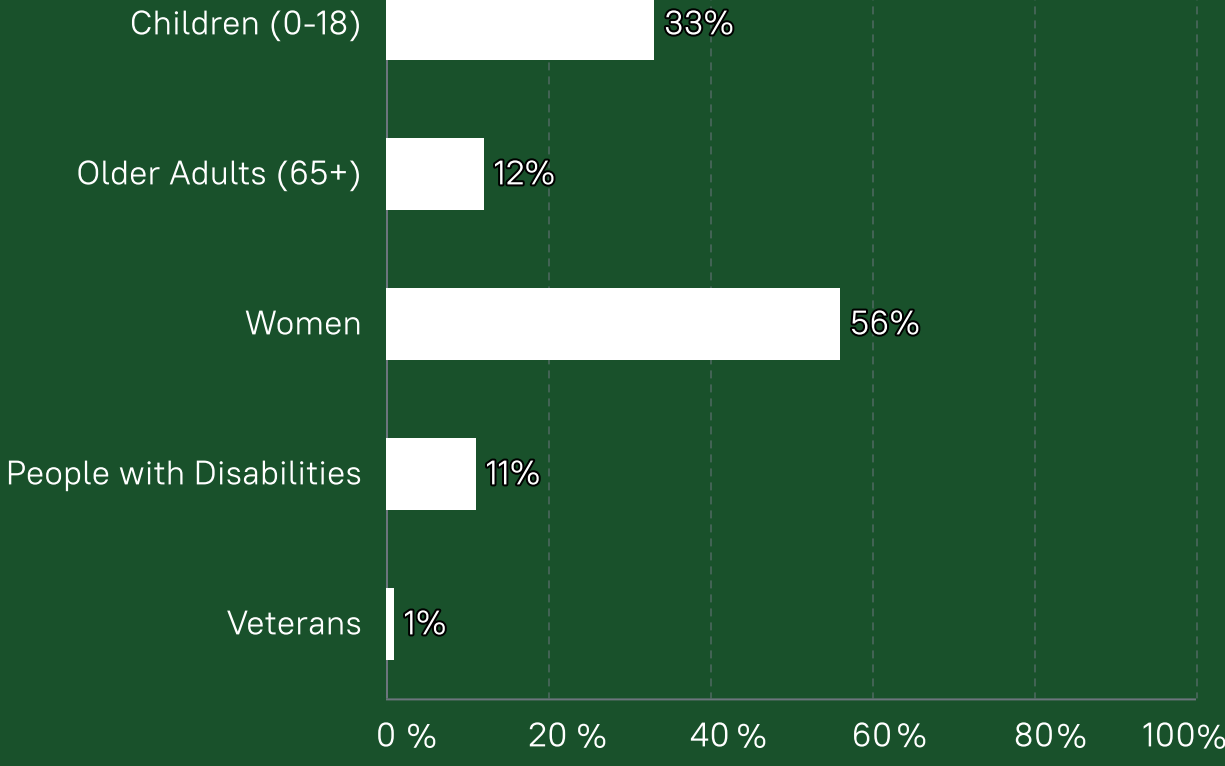

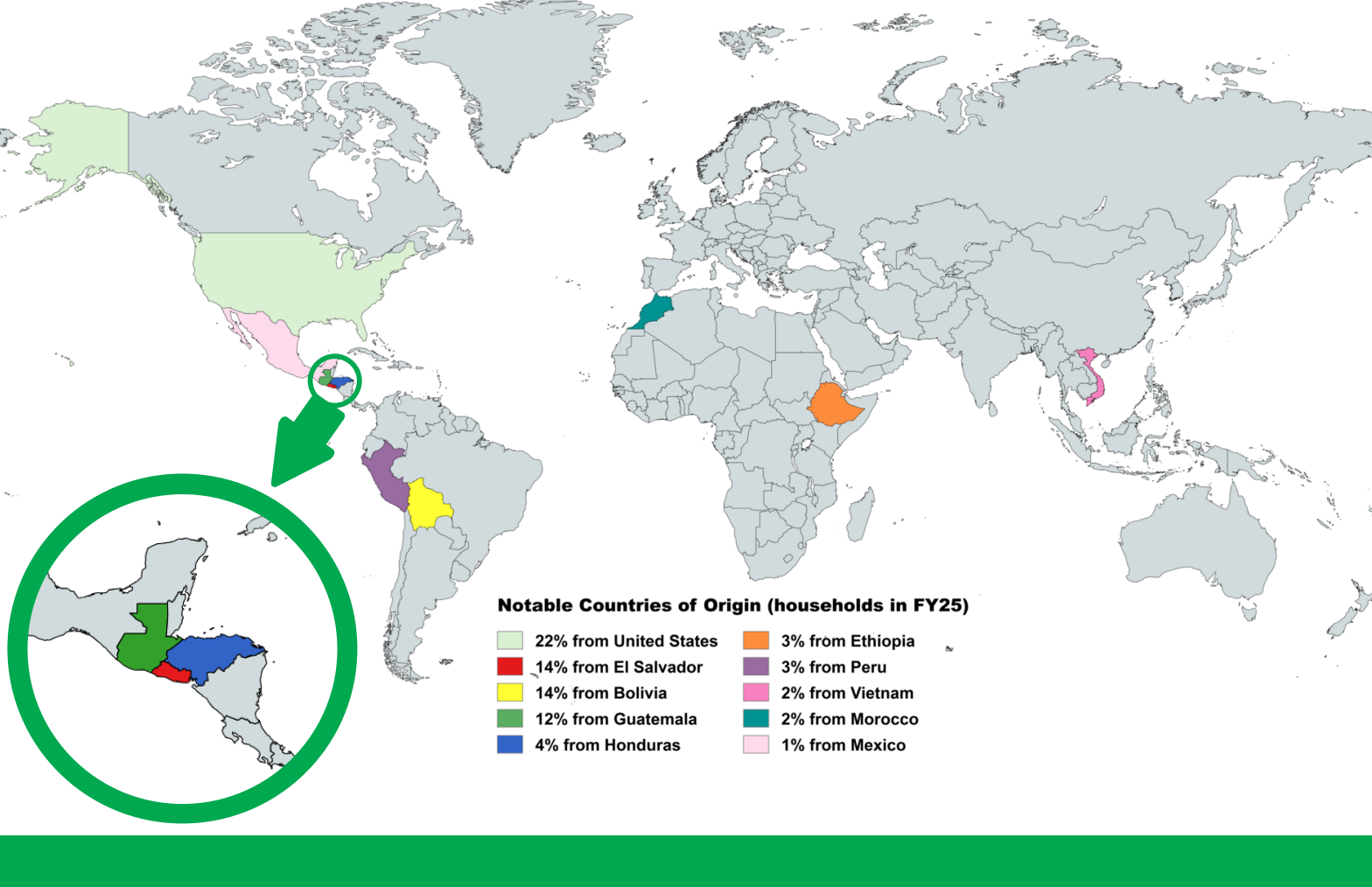

55% Hispanic/Latino

55% of AFAC households in FY25 were **Hispanic or Latino** - compared to 15.1% of Arlington.

19% Black or African American

19% of AFAC households in FY25 were **Black or African American** - compared to 9.2% of Arlington.

11% white

11% of AFAC households in FY25 were **white** - compared to 58.9% of Arlington.

Most Common Primary Languages of AFAC Clients

52%

of clients in FY25 spoke **Spanish** as their primary language

29%

of clients in FY25 spoke **English** as their primary language

3%

of clients in FY25 spoke **Amharic** as their primary language

3%

53%

of clients in FY25 were referred to AFAC by the Arlington County Department of Human Services (DHS)

26%

The remainder of clients were referred to AFAC by 23 other social service agencies



Household Composition

(Households served in FY25)

56% did not have children

42% were single individuals living alone

9% had three or more children

AFAC managed **21 weekly food distribution centers** and held **1,350** food distribution events in one year

39%

of clients attended a food distribution in their apartment building or immediate neighborhood, or got deliveries

61%

of clients traveled to a food distribution site in FY25



AFAC Home Delivery Program (FY25)



AFAC made **7,404** weekly deliveries to **214 (2.18%)** households



The program supports Arlington County's **most vulnerable** population gain reliable access to nutritious groceries



To qualify, participants are **homebound due to a physical disability or mental illness** that prevents them from leaving the home unassisted



Delivery orders are customized to **meet the participants' unique dietary needs**

Employment (Individuals in FY25)



36% of individuals worked **part-time**

8% of individuals worked **full-time**

10% of individuals were **retired**

43% of individuals were **unemployed**

75%

of households in FY25 worried about **running out of food before getting enough money to buy more**

*increased 5 percentage points from FY24

71%

of households in FY25 ran out of food and had **no money to buy more** within the last year

*increased 6 percentage points from FY24
